UNION AMALGAMATION.

At a specially-convened meeting of Croom
 Guardians the question of union amalgamation
 was considered, and it was decided not to oppose
 a scheme under which all the unions and work-

 central institutions. They believed, however, it

 of those institutions to supervise outdoor relief,
 which should be left in the hands of the guardians.

ARCHBISHOP MANNIX.

Addresses from Irish Clergy.

Yesterday, Archbishop Mannix was presented
 in London with addresses from the Prelates and
 Priests of Ireland. Replying to the addresses the
 Archbishop criticised the Government's Irish
 policy. Referring to peace negotiations, he said
 England could make peace any day with Ireland
 by giving Ireland what she wanted. He was not
 aware that any firm offer had been made to
 Ireland. Such a peace was not necessarily in-
 compatible with the security of the Empire. He
 urged the British Government to give up all
 higger muggor negotiations.

SAD FATALITY NEAR CHARLEVILLE.

A tragic occurrence took place between Bally-
