# TIPPERARY TRAGEDY.

## Chairman of Limerick County Council Killed.

Tipperary, Tuesday—The identity of the hithert unknown civilian shot dead along with Sergeant Kingston, R.I.C, near Annacarthy, Co Tippsrary, on Friday afternoon, has now been established as Mr John Wall, Chairman of the Limerick County

For the past two days his photo, showing him stripped from the waist upwards, with a bullet wound in the right side, had been exhibited by order of the police in a newsagent's windew, with the object of identification.

It was only last evening it became known, when relatives of the deceased came to arrange to re-

move the body to Limerick to-day for interment. Mr Wall, aged 32, and married, were a farmer and builder in Bruff, Co Limerick.

The remains of the late Mr John Wall arrived in Limerick yesterday by the 2.15 train from Tipperary. They were met at the station by the relatives of the deceased, who included the Rev T Wall, C.C. Dromcollogher, and Mr W Wall, Bruff, brothers; several members of the Limerick County Council, the officials, and a representative gathering of the general public. The come was placed in the hearse, and the cortege left for St John's Cathedral, where the remains rested overnight. When it become known that the identity of the deceased had been definitely established on Tuesday, sincere sorrow was felt by numerous friends in the city and county for the widow, young family, and relatives of the deceased. Re was a man of keen ability, genial and affable, and during his tenure of office of Chairman of the County Council he displayed qualities which endeared him to his colleaguer.

### The Funeral

Requiem High Mass was celebrated for the deceased in the Cathedral at 11 o'clock this morning. There was a large congregation, and the service was impressive and solemn. Bishop, Most Rev Dr Hallinan, presided. The celebrant was Rev Fr Wall, C.C. Dromcollogher. brother of the deceased; descon, Rev Fr Hayes, C.C; sub-deacon, Rev Fr Connolly, Adm, and master of ceremonies. Rev Fr McNamara, C.C.

At the conclusion of the Mass, the coffin, which was sovered with floral tributer, was taken out to the hearse, and the cortege formed up and travelled by the old town, along by the Mall, Patrick street, William street, and Mulgrave street, to Monnt St Lawrence Cemetery. There representative attendance in the cortege, while all along the route through which it passed the utmost respect was shown for the dead. There was no interference with the funeral procession, and it is pleasing to know that no untoward incident occurred to mar the solemnity of the occasion. On arrival at the cemetery the remains were laid to rest in the Republican circle on the eastern side of the mortuary chapel. -

# THE GENERAL SYNOD.

A very large attendance marked the opening day of the General Synod of the Church of Ireland in Dublin.

The Primate, in a clear and able address, though recognising the gravity of the present crisis in the history of our country, sounded s note of hope and encouragement, and maintained a tone of genuine and reasoned optimism throughout. He bore witness to the ability shown by clergy and laity at the special Synod of November, 1920, and to the generosity of the laity meeting the increased demands for the many tenance of the Church. The latter portion of the address was mainly occupied with an explanation of the work of the Lambeth Conference, especially in connection with the union of Christendom-s matter which also formed the subject of a long communication from the House of Bishops.

The President moved that an address of welcome be presented to Viscount FitzAlan of Derwent on his appointment as the representative of the King in Ireland.

Mr J A Maconchy seconded the motion, which

was unanimously passed.

The message and resolution from the House of Bishops dealing with the present state of Ireland was passed—the members standing—in a nicet solemn and impressive silence, brought to an end by a short and fervent prayer offered up by the Primate.

The Bill for reducing the number of Church dignitaries was defeated by 117 votes to 94.

The reduction in the number of the clargy makes it desirable that the old rule of only two laymen to one clergyman should be altered, and a bill to effect this change was discussed. The bill passed the second reading, but must be largely amended in committee.

The General Synod yesterday approved an address of welcome to the Lord Lieutenant.
