CHURCH OF IRELAND.

A meeting of the Limerick Diocesan Council was held on Friday, 29th May, the Dean of Limerick presiding. The Scheme for Amalgamation of Parishes was finally approved of, and ordered to be sent to the Commissioners appointed by the General Synod, and the Dean of Limerick and the Diocesan Secretary were appointed to represent the Diocese at the Inquiry. The Council allocated a Bonus of £700 out of Diocesan Funds to the Clergy of the Diocese for the current year.

FATAL BURNING ACCIDENT IN CITY.

Michael Bourke, aged between four and five years, residing with his parents in Clare-street, sustained fatal burning injuries yesterday morning. It appears that the little fellow and another were in the house at the time during the mother's absence momentarily. Through some inexplicable cause his clothing came into contact with the fire. In a moment he was a mass of flame, and despite the efforts of residents next door, who were attracted by his screams, it was impossible to do anything for the little sufferer, who subsequently succumbed in Barrington's Hospital.

THE NEWPORT AMBUSH.

Military Inquiry.

Yesterday Dublin Castle issued a report stating—A military Court of Inquiry, in lieu of an inquest, assembled at the New Barracks, Limerick, on the 16th May, 1921, to inquire into the death of District Inspector Henry Biggs, aged 26 years, of Newport, and Winifred Barrington, aged 22 years, only daughter of Sir Charles Barrington, Bart, of Glanetal Castle, Newport.

A report of the evidence follows. The Court found that Miss Winifred Barrington and District Inspector Henry Biggs had been murdered by persons unknown and are satisfied that the persons who fired the shots had known that a woman was in the car.
