He further states that he will have the trade resumed "as quickly as possible." In the interests, not alone of this country, but of cross-Channel requirements, the sooner things can be restored to the normal the better for all concerned

CHURCH OF IRELAND.

A meeting of the Limerick Diocesan Council was held on Friday, 29th May, the Dean of Limerick preciding. The Scheme for Amalgamation of Parishes was finally approved of, and ordered to be sent to the Commissioners appointed by the General Synod, and the Dean of Limerick and the Diocesan Secretary were appointed to represent the Diocesa at the Inquiry. The Council allocated a Bonus of £700 out of Diocesan Funds to the Clergy of the Diocesa for the current year.
