EXECUTION IN LIMERICK.

Limerick Man Shot.

Scene Outside Barracks.

This morning, pursuant to a notice received yesterday, Thomas Keane, No. 1 Moore-lane, Limerick, was executed at the Military Detention Barracks, Limerick. The prisoner was charged with levying war and being improperly in possescion of arms at Singland on the lat uit, and convicted at a Field General Courtmartial on the 17th ult, the trial having opened on Saturday, the 14th ult. Since his conviction the prisoner had been in the County Prison, from which he was removed yesterday to the Military Detention Up to last evening it was hoped that the memorial for a reprieve, extensively signed in the city by the Most Rev Dr Hallinan and other influential citizens, would result in a dommutation of the gentence, but when it became known that the prisoner had been removed from the County Gaol yesterday all hope abandoned. It is stated that he bore ordeal remarkab'y well, and received the ministrations of the military chaplain, the Rev Jas Hayes, C.C, St Michael's. with the greatest attention and reverence. This morning at 7 o'clock Mass was celebrated in the prisoner's eall by Fr Hayes. The prisoner followed the service with great devotion and received Holy Communion with the utmost reverence and respect. At the corolusion of the Mass Fr Hayes imparted the Papal Blessing to the condemned man, who walked to the place of execution without faltering, and died firmly. Immediately after the execution, which was by shooting, the body was annointed by Fr Hayes, who then withdrew.

For two hours, from six c'clock to eight, th s morning large numbers of people, men, women, and children congregated cutcile the New Barracks and the approaches thereto. Prayers were recited for the dead by the entire concourse. and sacred emblems were carried by many of the women present. At eight o'clock, when all was over, and it F 8.5 known that the execution had taken place, the crowds gradually dispersed. Pathatio figures in the assemblage were the wife of Thomas Keaur, and his aged mother. At the trial of the deceased it was stated that he was thirty years of age married, with a wife and two young children dependent on him.

Official Report.

The military authorities have issued

following official report : --

Thomas Keane, civilian, 1 Moore Lane, Lime-1 lok, was tried by a military court on the 14/5/1921. on two charges: (1) With levying war, and (2) with being improperly in possession of a revolver. Keans was found guilty of both charges, and sentenced to be shot. The sentence was duly carried out this morning at 8 c'clock.
