deceased's family.

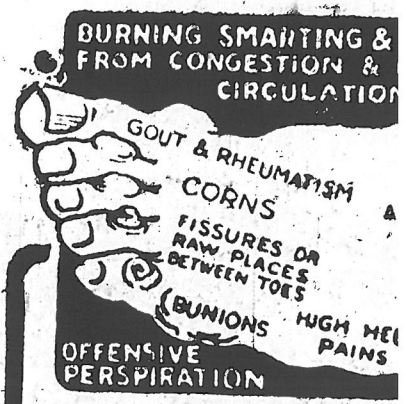
THE LATE MR THOMAS KEANE AND MR P WHITE.
