

On Sunday evening the body of an unknown man was recovered from the River Shannon, near Plassy Mills, by some men who were fishing in the locality during the day. The remains were that of a well set-up man of 45 years of age or so, and were in a decomposed condition. They were removed in the Corporation Fire Brigade ambulance to the morgue at Barrington's Hospital, where efforts to establish identity have so far been unsuccessful. A military enquiry in lieu of an inquest will be held to-morrow at the New Barracks into the cause of death.

Mr Henry J Forde, of the Manor of St John, Waterford, whose name was mentioned among the Irish Knights in the Birthday Honours, is managing director of Messrs R. and H. Hall, Limited, of Waterford, Cork, Dublin, Belfast, and Westport.
