# CITY BATHING FATALITY.

### Railway Employe Drowned.

A distressing bathing fatality took place on Sunday evening at Parteen, the victim being Thomas Cahill, an employe of the G.S & W. Railway Company at the goods depot. During the evening Cahill, who was a poor swimmer, went to bathe in a greek near the lax weir, when he got beyond his depth and disappeared. Some people who were pic-nicing a short distance away, hearing the commotion rushed to the scene, and two or three of them entering the water where poor Cabill disappeared, brought him to the bank. At that time Cabill appeared to be dead. Artificial respiration was resorted to, but despite all the efforts used the unfortunate man was beyoud human aid. The deceased, who was un-married, lived at Parteen, and the greatest sympathy is felt for his relatives in the affliction which has befallen them.

## Soldier Drowned.

Two soldiers, belonging to the Royal Engineers, while motor cycling from Limerick on runday met with an accident, which in the case of one had fatal results.
