  - "3. The restrictions against carrying arms have not been suspended. Civilians, therefore, obviously carrying arms or marching in military formation are liable to be dealt with as heretofore.
  - "4. With the exception of those mentioned in paragraph 1, all other restrictions remain in force.

**CITY BATHING FATALITY.**

**Railway Employe Drowned.**

A distressing bathing fatality took place on Sunday evening at Parteen, the victim being Thomas Cahill, an employe of the G.S. & W. Railway Company at the goods depot. During the evening Cahill, who was a poor swimmer, went to bathe in a creek near the lax weir, when he got beyond his depth and disappeared. Some people who were pic-nicing a short distance away, hearing the commotion rushed to the scene, and two or three of them entering the water where poor Cahill disappeared, brought him to the bank. At that time Cahill appeared to be dead. Artificial respiration was resorted to, but despite all the efforts used the unfortunate man was beyond human aid. The deceased, who was unmarried, lived at Parteen, and the greatest sympathy is felt for his relatives in the affliction which has befallen them.

**ACCIDENT AT BUNRATTY.**

**Soldier Drowned.**

Two soldiers, belonging to the Royal Engineers, while motor cycling from Limerick on Sunday met with an accident, which in the case of one had fatal results. Being unware that the bridge spanning the river at Bunratty was breached the machine dashed into it. Both soldiers were precipitated into the river, the driver of the vehicle, Sapper Williams, being drowned, the other reaching the bank in an exhausted condition. The body of Williams was recovered some time later and taken to the morgue at the Military Barracks pending an enquiry. The unfortunate occurrence, coming on the eve of the truce, was learned with regret in the city.
