DEATH OF MR M. COUGHLAN.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Michael Coughlan, which took place at Kilkee on Tuesday evening. The deceased, who was fifty-six years of age, had been sojourning in the West Clare seaside resort for the benefit of bis health, which for some time past had not been too robust. He was taken ill unexpectedly, and died in a short time. Mr Coughlan was telegraphic overseer at the Limerick Post Office for two years, and in that capacity his services were appreciated by the authorities, and with the public who came into contact with him. He was a native of Skibbereen, where he joined the Post Office telegraph service, being subsequently transferred to Traice, and thence to the Limerick staff, with which he to the Limerick staff, with which he was connected for thirty eight years. Invariably courteous and considerate in the discharge of his duties, he was a great favourite with his colleagues, and enjoyed their confidence as well as that of the authorities. His death has come as a shock to the members of his family, with whom sincere sympathy is felt in their bereavement.

The remains were removed to St Michael's Parochial Church last evening on the arrival of the 8.25 train from Ennis. This evening at 4.15 the funeral left for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery, where the interment took place. There was a large attendance of the general public, including members of the Postal and Telegraph Staff and of the Postal Workers' Union, present to pay a final tribute of respect to the deceased, who was held in high regard by his colleagues and the citizens

The chief mourners wers-Mr John Coughlan, brother, and Mise M Coughlan, sister.

The clergy present were—Rev Fr Dwane, Adm St Michael's; Rev Fr Carroll, C.C; Rev Fr Thornhill, C.C, and Rev Fr Tracy, C.C.

Fr Dwane officiated at the grave.
