a suporing anair, involving the serious wounding of Constable Martin Cassidy, R.I.C, took place in the city early yesterday morning. The particulars with regard to the incident are conflicting. The constable, who is stated to be a native of Belfast, left Mary-street barracks, where he is stationed, at half-past twelve yesterday morning, and some four hours or so later he was found lying unconscious in close proximity to the barracks, with a bullet wound in the back and another in the left leg. The constable having been attended by the Rev Fr Carroll and Dr M Shipsey, R.A.M.C. was removed to the military hospital. Various reports are in circulation as regards the shooting, but until an enquiry is held nothing definite can be known. In the locality where the shooting is stated to have taken place some people give currency to a report that the constable was shot in the course of a scuffie. Whatever the exact circumstances are, the shooting undoubtedly created a sensation in the city, and has been the subject of speculation and conjecture. #### LIMIRICKMAN'S TRAGIC DEATH NEAR GLASGOW.

Mr Thomas Black, compositor, Sexton Street North, Themondgate, received a telegram from Captain Blair, C.M.A, Georgetown, Glasgow, on Sunday, stating that his son, Private Harry W Black, had been burned to death at 3.15 that morning while asleep in his room. The tragio news came as a great shock to Mr Black and his family, for whom the greatest sympathy is felt in the death of a promising young fellow.
