COUNTY LIMERICK TRAGEDY.

Drowned in a Well.

Charleville, Wednesday Night.—News reached Charleville to-day of a tragic occurrence which took place at Kilbreedy, near Stylepark, Bruree, as a result of which a farmer named Michael O'shea, aged about 60 years, lost his life by drowning. Exact details are not available, but it appears that the deceased was missing from home on Monday evening, and on a search being made his dead body was found in a well near his own residence.
