DEATH OF THE VERY REV CANON LISTON, P.P, V.F.

We regret to record the death, which took place in St John's Hospital, Limerick, on Saturday night, of the Very Rev Thos. Canon Liston, P.P, V.F, Shanagolden. The rev gentleman had reached his seventy-third year, and had only been ailing for a short period. In the diocese of Limerick his death has been learned with regret by his brethren in the ministry and by his late parishioners for his zeal and piety. He was ordained in Rome in 1872, and on his way home he joined the Salesian Order under the spiritual guidance of the Venerable Dom Bosco, but he was retained in his own diocese by the then Bishop, Most Rev Dr Butler. His first curacy was at Ballygarry, then Askeaton from which he was translated to Rathkeale where he laboured for twenty years. He was appointed to the pastorate of the united parishes of Kilmeedy and Feenagh by the late Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, and after eleven years was transferred to the united parishes of Shanagolden, Foynes and Robertstown, where he ministered for fourteen years, taking a deep interest in the spiritual and material welfare of his flock. In 1915 he was appointed a Canon of the Cathedral Chapter, and two years later he was made Vicar Forane. The late Canon Liston was an ecclesiastical theologian. With the late Bishop, Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, he was instrumental in completing the fine and graceful church of St Mary at Rathkeale, and helped in securing for the Sisters of Mercy in that town the splendid convent which has conferred such educational benefits on the children of the parish.

The remains were removed from St John's Cathedral at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, for Shanagolden, where Requiem Mass was celebrated today, and the interment took place immediately after, in the church grounds. In the unavoidable absence of the Bishop, Most Rev Dr Hallinan, the Right Rev Monsignor O'Donnell, P.P, V.G, Rathkeale, presided at the Requiem Mass.
