### POSTAL RATES.

It appears to be the welcome prospect of this year relief will come to a long public (by a reduction of the charges for a considerable time) operation, with all their handicaps on trade and industry. ## LIMERICK FISHERY BOARD.

Mr J J Adams presided at the meeting of the Limerick Fishery Conservators yesterday. There were also present—Colonel Whitehead, Messrs A Blood-Smyth, W Holmes, C E, and J Glynn, with H Bindon Alton, secretary.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Irish Board of Fishery Conservators, Dublin, relative to the decision of the Limerick Board regarding the question of increasing the licence duty on rods and nets in the district. The letter pointed out that the majority of Boards of Conservators favoured increasing the duty on rods by double the present figure, and deferring taking any action in increasing the duty payable on nets until next year. Want of uniformity, it was pointed out, would be undesirable in the case of the duty payable on rod licences, and should be dealt with by the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Agriculture. The Board were invited to renew the annual subscription to the Central Authority.

Mr Blood-Smyth expressed his opinion that no increase should be made in rod licence duty. He was in favour of renewing the annual subscription.

The Chairman gave a similar expression of view.

The Board decided to renew their annual subscription of £5.

Some Departmental business having been transacted, the meeting separated.

## DEATH OF A VOLUNTEER.

The death took place in the County Infirmary on Tuesday, of Mr Jeremiah O'Neill, a member of the East Limerick Brigade I.R.A. The deceased who was barely eighteen years of age, was a native of Cork, and some weeks back he contracted a chill which terminated fatally. He was removed from the County Hospital, Croom, to the Infirmary quite recently, and everything possible done for him by the staff was without avail. Last evening at 4 o'clock the remains were removed to the railway station en route for Cork, where the interment is to take place. The coffin was covered by the Sinn Fein colours, and preceding the hearse was the city Sinn Fein Band, which played funeral marches to the terminus. After the hearse passed it was witnessed by large numbers of people.
