LIMERICK FISHERY BOARD.

Mr J J Adams presided at the meeting of the Limerick Fishery Conservators yesterday. There were also present—Colonel Whitehead, hessre A Blood-Smyth, W. H. Imes, C.E., and J. Glynn, with H Bindon Alton, secretary.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the trick Board of Fishery Conservators, Dublin, relative to the decision of the Limerick Board regarding the question of increasing the licence duty on rods and nets in the district. The letter pointed out that the majority of Boards of Conservators favoured increasing the duty on rods by double the present figure, and deferring taking any action in increasing the duty payable on nets until next year. Want of uniformity, it was pointed out, would be undesirable in the case of the duty payable on rod licence, and should be dealt with by the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Agriculture. The Board were invited to renew the annual subscription to the Central Authority.

Mr Blood-Smyth expressed his opinion that no increase should be made in rod licence duty. He was in favour of-renewing the annual subscription.

The Chairman gave a similar expression of iew.

The Board decided to renew their annual subscription of £5.

Some Departmental business having been transacted, the meeting separated.

DEATH OF A VOLUNTEER.
