CITY EPIDEMIC SUBSIDING.

ALL SCHOOLS TO RE-OPEN.

Dr M. S. McGrath, Medical Superintendent Officer of Health, has reported to the Public Health Committee that only one case of scarlatina and one of a very mild type of diphtheria had taken place since the 4th instant, and under the circumstances he has recommended that all the city schools might be allowed to re-open on Monday, the 16th instant. It should be understood that daily disinfection of the schools must be carried out for the present, and that children under eleven years of age should be sent home from school not later than 2 o'clock each day.

The report was approved, and notification to be sent to the school masters.

THE BELFAST DISTURBANCES.

APPEAL BY CHURCH LEADERS.

"The present state of things in Belfast is a source of deep anxiety to all who have at heart the well-being and good name of our city. It is not possible to regard the happenings which are taking place without a deep sense of humiliation and shame," states an appeal issued in Belfast by the Right Rev Dr Love, Moderator of the General Assembly; the Bishops of Down and Connor and Dromore, and Rev W. H. Smyth, President of the Methodist Church. They add—"We would earnestly appeal to all who may regard our words to exercise the strictest control over their own words and actions, and to use all the influence they can command to bring to an end the outbreaks of crime, which are disgrace to any civilised community."

The statement concludes with the suggestion that all Protestant clergymen should address their congregations next Sunday on the need of peace.

DEATH OF REV. D. CONSIDINE, S.J.

Rev. Daniel Considine, S.J., whose death at Southampton is announced, was son of the late Mr Heffernan Considine. He was in his 73rd year.
