inquest was opened at Barrington's Hospital, on Sunday, under the auspices of the City Republican Police, into the circumstances connected with the death of Peter Switzer, a farmer, of Moig. Pallastenry, who died in the Institution on Friday night. The deceased, who was about 75 years of age, was fired at and seriously wounded in the head and face while attending bis sister's funeral on Tuesday Castletown. last at He BAW removed into Barrington's Hospital on Thursday and, as stated, death took place the following night. In the absence of evidence of identifica-

Yesterday morning a jury was summoned by direction of the Royal Irish Constabulary with a view to Dr M R Clery, County Coroner, holding an inquest on the remains. When Dr Clery arrived at the hospital he ascertained he had no jurisdiction as death had occurred in the city. District Inspector of Constabulary for Adare then essayed to have the inquiry held by two magistrates, but it was subsequently learned that no investigation was held, and the remains were interred at 2 o'clock in St Mary's Cathedral Cemetery.
