that there was nothing political associated with the burning, which, it was inferred, was due to an effort to get at the estate books, which it was thought by the perpetrators of the outrage were kept in the office.

Evidence was called, and showed that on the evening previous to the burning the place was all right, and no fires had been lighted in the apartments for some days before. Next morning the employees, when they came to resume work, found the out-offices on fire, and all the contents involved. Plates and glass were scattered over the yard, which went to establish an explosion.

Mr T Scully, Architect and Engineer, stated that he estimated the damage at £1,447, exclusive of the contents.

His Honor gave a decree for £1,670, with costs and expenses.

BURNING FATALITY IN THE CITY.

Old Man's Death

A sad burning fatality has occurred in the city. A Republican police patrol, while on duty in William street on Tuesday night at eleven o'clock, discovered an outbreak of fire in a small shop in Michael street or Chapel Lane, inhabited by John Hogan, aged 60, and a widower. When the premises were forced it was found that the place had been enveloped in smoke, and the man Hogan in a state of collapse. The Fire Brigade was summoned, and on arrival Hogan, who was then found to be dead, was taken in the ambulance to Barrington's Hospital. It appears that the deceased, who was employed as a van-driver, not feeling well, left work early on Tuesday and went to bed. He is supposed to have been reading during the night and fell asleep, and that the lighted candle set fire to the bed-covering, with fatal consequences. Hogan, who was a kindly man and a hard-working man, lived alone in the house.

Inquest and Verdict.

An inquest was held under the auspices of the City Republican Police last evening in Barrington's Hospital, on the body of the deceased.

Evidence of identification having been given and the circumstances narrated as to the discovery of the deceased by some men who were attracted by the flames from the house, the medical testimony established that death was due to asphyxiation caused by smoke fumes.

The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony.
