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cial Urban Districts of the Irish Free State, with the annual rates per 1,000 of the population represented thereby, which, for the purposes of those returns, is estimated at 662,256, are given in Table I of the Registrar-General's report for the week ending 14th January, 1922. The births are represented by 280 in the Dublin Registration Area; Cork, 15.6; Limerick, 25.7; Waterford, 32.3. The deaths from all causes appertaining to the undermentioned areas for last week and for the past four weeks, respectively, were equal to the following annual rates per 1,000 of the population:—Twelve Town Districts, 22.2 and 22.5; Dublin Registration Area, 25.5 and 27.0; Dublin City, 23.8 and 29.0; Cork, 22.4 and 17.5; Limerick, 20.3 and 18.3; and Waterford, 7.6 and 9.5. The deaths from certain epidemic diseases registered in the 12 town districts during last week were equal to an annual rate of 0.8 per 1,000. Among the 6 deaths from all causes for Sligo is one from typhus and one from diarrhoea. A table is appended showing the number of cases of infectious diseases notified in cities and certain Urban districts during the week-ended 14th January, and each of the preceding three weeks as furnished by the respective Sanitary Authorities. Cases of scarlet fever reported in the City of Limerick for the four weeks were:—December 24th, 2; December 31st, 2; January 7th, 1; January 14th, 1. The reported cases of diphtheria (including membranous croup) were:—December 24th, 4; Dec 31st, 6; January 7th, 2; Jan 14th, 1.

THE LATE MR MAT BARRY.

Sincere regret is felt by many friends in Limerick at the unexpected demise of Mr Matthew Barry, which took place on Monday at his residence, Rosaleen, Glasheen-road, Cork, after a short illness. Deceased, who spent many years in the postal service, was of a very kind-hearted and altogether taking disposition, and was held in high regard by a large circle of acquaintances. He was son-in-law of an esteemed citizen, the late Mr Denis O'Keeffe, Superintendent of Telegraphs, Limerick.
