## DEATH OF MR M D MCCOY, SOLICITOR

The death, which we announce with regret, occurred in a Dublin Nursing Home yesterday morning of Mr M D McCoy, solicitor, O'Connell-street, Limerick. The deceased, who was son of the late Mr P McCoy, Duncah, Ardagh, had been ailing for a considerable time, and slender hopes were entertained by his friends for his recovery. He was admitted a solicitor in 1892, and for a number of years was an assistant to the late Mr John Ryan, solicitor, Limerick, subsequently becoming a partner in the firm, and on the demise of Mr Ryan he conducted the business solely. He was legal adviser to Limerick No 1 District Council, and had an extensive practice. In social life Mr McCoy was held in great respect, and the news of his death at the age of 52 years has been learned by his colleagues with keen sorrow. The remains will arrive at Boher station at half past one to-morrow, and the funeral will immediately take place for Abington cemetery for interment.
