On Sunday last Lord Emly celebrated his birthday. Lord Emly, who is the second Baron, was born in 1858, and succeeded in 1894. He married in 1891 a daughter of the late John Power, of Gurteen, who is related to the Count de la Poer. The first Baron Emly, William Menzel, of Tarvoe, was M.P. for Limerick, 1847-1872, and filled office as Vice-President of the Board of Trade, Under-Secretary for the Colonies and P.M.G. He was created a Baron in 1873.

Lord Shaughnessy, the Canadian-Irish magnate, is said to be one of the three submitted for the approval of the Provisional Government as representative in the British Commonwealth of Nations. He was born in Milwaukee, and comes from a West Limerick family.

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# THE MURDERS OF LATE MAYOR AND EX-MAYOR OF LIMERICK

## Anniversary Mass and Procession.

It being the anniversary of the murders of Alderman George Claney, Mayor; Councillor Michael O'Callaghan, ex-Mayor of Limerick and Volunteer Joseph O'Donoghue, business was suspended in the city until one o'clock to-day, when the shops re-opened.

Requiem High Mass was celebrated in St John's Cathedral at 9 a.m. for the dead, and was attended by a large congregation. The service was very impressive and solemn, and awakened sad memories in the minds of the citizens, particularly of the bereaved relatives of the deceased.

The celebrant of the Mass was Rev Fr Connolly, Adm, St John's; deacon, Rev Fr Rice, C.C. do; sub-deacon, Rev Fr Carroll, C.C. do; master of our monies, Rev Fr McNamara, C.C. do.

The clergy in the choir were—Very Rev Canon O'Driscoll, P.P., V.F., St Munchin's; Rev Fr Moloney, C.C. do; Rev Fr Murphy, P.P., St Patrick's; Very Rev Fr Hogan, President of St Munchin's College; Rev Dr O'Brien, do; Rev Fr Carroll, C.C., St Michael's; Rev Fr Hannan, C.C. do; Rev Fr Treacy, C.C. do; Rev Fr Fitzpatrick C.C. do; Rev Fr Kelly, C.C. St John's; Rev Fr O'Sullivan, C.C., St Mary's; Rev Fr Murphy, S.J.; Rev Fr O'Donoghue, S.J.; Rev Fr Nash, O.F.M.; Rev Fr Ferdinand, O.F.M.; and Rev Fr Smith, O.P.

At the conclusion of the service a procession took place to the Republican circle, Mount St Lawrence Cemetery. It was led by Canon McBan, followed by about 4 hundred armed men who arrived in the city since Sunday; next came a number of unarmed members of the Mid-Limerick Brigade, I.R.A.; after whom walked a number of Boy Scouts, the Mayor and members of the Corporation, and citizens.

On arriving at the Cemetery the Rosary was recited in Irish, after which the procession dispersed.

## DEATH OF MRS GORDON O'NEILL.

Very many friends in Limerick and elsewhere will regret to learn of the death of Mrs Gordon O'Neill, which took place somewhat unexpectedly at her residence, 1 Quinlan street, on Sunday night.
