He was one of the best known commercial travelers in the South of Ireland, and was a gentleman of sound business views. The remains will be removed to St Michael's Church at 7.30 o'clock this evening, and the funeral will take place after Requiem Mass at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.
