### General's Report.

Deaths registered in the Dublin Area and in eleven principal provincial districts of the Irish Free State, with rates per 1,000 of the population respectively, which, for the purposes of these estimates at 662,253, are given in the Registrar-General's report ending Saturday, 18th inst. The rates presented by 25.0 in the Dublin Area, Cork, 15.0; Limerick, 27.1. The deaths from all causes appear in the unmentioned areas for last four weeks, respectively to the following annual rates per population:—Twelve Town District, 23.1; Dublin Registration Area, Dublin City, 24.9 and 24.5;
