AMNESTY FOR SINN FEIN PRISONERS.

In British Gaols.

The British Government, through the Home Secretary, ordered the release of all prisoners in British prisons convicted of Sinn Fein offences, irrespective of whether they were committed pefore or after the truce.

The amneety applies to the prisoners committed at the A siz s, including Glamorgan, and even to nilitary prisoners, such as the Guardsmen convioled of heft of arms and ammunition,

The War Office objected to the release of those mee, but the Home Office would not make fish of one and fowl of another. The orders of release were, there'ore, made applicable to everybody as and from Saturday last.

CLAIMS BY LANDLESS MEN.

Mr Coror A Magnine presided at a Sinn Fein Land Commission Court held in the County Courthouse, Limerick, on Tuesday. The proceedings were for the purpose of investigating claims by landless men and those in possession of uncoopomic holdings in the district of Caberconlish to a share of the lands recently purchased there by the late Mr Connors, and to have the lands divided.

Mr Ebrill, solr, Limerick, for the claimants; Mr John Binchy, solr (Messrs Binchy, Charleville), for the executors of the late Mr Conners, and Mr Liston, solr, Charleville, for the next-of-kin.

After a considerable hearing of the legal gentlemen engaged, the Court decided to appoint an inspector to investigate and report on the matter.

It is understood that this particular battalion was selected to go to Constantinople because it stands at the top of the roster for foreign service.

IRISH EXPORTED BUTTER.

Grading Scheme.

At a conference of different Irish organisations and representatives of the factory and home butter-making interests in Dublin on the 30th ult, at which the Minister of Agriculture presided, it was decided that a scheme for the grading of Irich exported butter should be a Government one, and that participation in it for each shipper should be optional. Approval to the scheme subm tted by the I.D.A and I.C.M.A.

The principal points of the scheme include the institution of a national brand of quality based mairly on the grading at the port of shipment of a sample or samples of each lot of butter, shipped under the brand, and the advertising of such brand in the British trade papers and other

mediums in alternative markets.

The funeral of Boy Scout Thomas Slattery. whose death occurred on Monday morning as the result of an accident while handling a revolver. tock place from St John's Cathedral at 4.30 p.m on Tuesday for interment in Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.
