The remaining twenty quietly left, taking with them their belongings. Thus disposessed the army then took up temporary residence in some houses in the town and are awaiting orders from General Headquarters.

Quilty Coastguard station as well as Kilrush and Kilkee barracks, were taken over by Republicans on Briday last.

Ronistymon barracks are also in the hands of Republican soldiers.

CITY SHOOTING ACCIDENT.

Michael O'Neill, aged 24 years, Barrack Lane, Thomondgate, was accidentally wounded by a rifle ballet at the New Barracks on Sunday, and lies in a critical condition in Barrington's Hospital, whither he was removed after the accident in the Fire Brigade Ambulance. The bullet entered the left shoulder, and passed through the upper portion of the body, finding an exit at the right side.

Death of the Patient.

Enquiries made at the hospital this morning elicited that the patient was very weak, and still in a critical condition. It was learned later that he had succumbed to his injuries, death laving taken place at one o'clock. From the outset the medical staff at the hos, ital entertained no hope of his recovery, as the bullet travelled right acress the upper portion of the body, and affected the most vital parts.

An inquest was opened into the circumstances connected with the tragic occurrence this evening and adjourned,

TRAGIC ACCIDENT AT KILMALLOCK.

The death took place at Kilmaliock on Sunday night of Mr Thomas Hogan, Sheares street, under tragic circumstances. Mr Hogan was assisting at a lecal councert, in the ticket department, and when putting a revolver in his pocket, or taking it there from, the weapon accidentally discharged, the bullet entering Mr Hogan's body. He was attended by Rev Fr Mangan, C.O., and died in about a quarter of an hour after the occurrence. The ticket office was some distance from the Concert hall, and when the circumstances became known there the proceedings were brought to a close. Great sympathy is extended to the respected family of the deceased on their bereavement.

MEETING OF NENAGH PROTESTANTS.

Northern Crime Condemned.

Right Rev Dr Berry, Bishop of Killaloe, presiding at a large meeting of Protestants of Neuagh and district, said that their condemnation of auts of violence in Ireland was absolute and uncompromising. It would be base ingratitude if they failed to acknowledge the unvarying kind. ness and courtesy of those among whom their lot had been cast. They were all confident that the present clouds would disappear,

Messra J O Moynar, C &; W L Hodgins, LL.B; S G Parker-Hutchinson, A Parker, O M Carroll, Major H Lefroy, and the Rev J H Yates and others also spoke in condemnation of outrages. Resolutions were unanimously passed calling on newspapers of every shade of politics to abstain from publishing sectarian articles : calling on the Irish Government to leave no means undone to stop crimes, especially in the Six Northern Counties, and declaring that they were deter-Cathele fellow-countrymen in the Northern Parliament area must be treated in the same way as they, Southern Protestants were treated.

Other resolutions emphatically denied the statements of certain high personages that Protestants as such in the South were being persecuted on account of their religion, and declared that the Protestants would give loyal support to any Government freely and legally elected.

Resolution of Elimallock Vestry.

The Select Vestry of Kilmallock, Brures, and Athlacca, the Rev Canon Taylor presiding, unspimously passed a resolution expressing horror at the murders in Belfast, and stating that, though a small minority, they had always received the most friendly treatment and had not suffered from intelerance of any kind from their Catholic neigh. bours. They urged that the expelled Oatholic workers should be rejustated without delay. -0+-

DEATH OF MR T J WESTROPP.

Irish archaeology has suffered a serious fore in the death of Thomas Johnson Westropp, which securred on Sunday morning. The youngest son of the late John Westropp, of Astyflin, Co Limerick, he graduated in Arts in Dablin University, and afterwards studied engineering for a short time practising this profession. But the attractions of archaeology, sepecially field work, in the study of the ancient forts of Ireland, upon which he was the recognised authority, and on which he had published a most valuable monograph in 1902, led him to devote more and more time to the study of the ancient civilisation of Ireland, The numerous communications in the "Proceedings" of the Royal Irish Academy and Journal of the Society of Antiquaries of Ireland, as well as in the pages of various local societies, bear witness to his untiring industry in this large

Mr Westropp was, President of the Boyal Society of Antiquaries of Ireland from 1916 to 1919. He also served upon the Council of the Royal Irish Academy from 1898 to the present date, with abort intervals, and was a Vice-President from 1916 to 1919. He was one of the Board of Visitors of the National Museum, and was exceedingly active in the performance of these duties. He was also a corresponding member of the Prehistoria Scelety of France.

Apart from his distinction as an archaelogiet, Mr Westropp's personal charm, unselfishness, and geniality endeared him to his friends, by whom his memory will long be held in respect as an admirable type of a patriotic Irish gentleman.

Imposing Cortege.

The re-interment of Captain Thomas Keene, "C" Company, Limerick City Battation, I.R.A., who was executed at the New Barracks, Limerick, on the 4th June last, took place on Sunday in the Republican Circle, Mount St. Laurence Cemetery. The remains were removed from the County Prison on Friday evening to St. John's Cathedral, where Requiem Mass was celebrated for the dead officer on Saturday morning. At three o'clock yesterday the funeral left the Cathedral for the cometery, and travelled by Br. Lelia-street, Clare-street, Assembly Mall, Rutland street, Patrick-street, and William-street. The cortege, which was of large proportions, included thirty of the city clergy, the hearse being preceded by a firing party of the L.R.A. and two bands. In the cortege were a large body of I.R.A, members of the Corporation, trades and labour bodies, Cumann na mBan, Boy Scouts, and the boys of St. Joseph's Orphanage, as well as members of the general public. The route to the cemetery was lined by large numbers of the citizens, and on reaching Mount St. Laurence the clergy chanted the Miserers on the way to the grave.
