CITY BOMB EXPLOSION.

One Man Dead and Three Injured.

A bomb explosion, stated to be accidental, but unfortunately attended with a fatal result, occurred in Edward-street towards midnight on Saturday. The particulars relating to the explosion—how it occurred, or under what circumstances—are rather conflicting. It appears that a number of young men were after leaving a house in the locality, but what transpired subsequently is not obtainable with any degree of accuracy. Whatever the circumstances, a loud explosion followed, with the result that a young man named Michael O'Connell of Boherbaoy, was fatally wounded, and three others, William Allen, John Gilligan, and James O'Connell injured. Michael O'Connell was immediately attended to by a priest and doctor, and removed in the Fire Brigade ambulance to Barrington's Hospital, where he died soon after admission. Gilligan and Allen received serious injuries to the legs, arms, and face, and were also taken to Barrington's Hospital, where they were detained for treatment. James O'Connell received a wound in the right arm, but was not detained after being treated by the House Surgeon, Dr W P Dundon. Enquiries made at the hospital elicited that Gilligan and Allen, who are house painters, were doing as well as can be expected.

The remains of Michael O'Connell were removed to his home on Sunday evening, and yesterday evening Mr J S MacNeice, Coroner, with a jury opened an inquest at the Railway Hotel into the circumstances attending death.

Evidence of identification having been given by Annie O'Connell, sister of the deceased, the enquiry was adjourned until Thursday evening at 6 o'clock.
