

The Statement of Accounts.

The Cunard Steamship Company's statement of accounts for the year ended December 31st last, shows that after providing for depreciation of ships and other properties and plant, income tax, corporation profits tax, debenture interest and proportion of discount on debenture stock, and including £169,075 brought forward from 1920, there remains at credit of profit and loss account £669,105. Dividends, amounting to £135,000, have been paid on the 5 per cent. and 8 per cent. Preference stock. The directors recommend a dividend of 7½, payable on and after May 1st, of 7½ per cent on Ordinary shares, including Government share, from which income tax will be deducted, leaving a balance of £199,889, which is carried forward.

DEATH OF MISS O'REILLY.

The death took place rather unexpectedly on Easter Sunday, at her residence, 46 Richmond-street, Limerick, of Miss Alice Ita O'Reilly, youngest daughter of the late Thomas and Mrs O'Reilly, of this city. She was well known in the business houses in the city, as since her mother's death she practically managed all the household duties. The funeral, which took place on Tuesday from St Michael's Parochial Church to the New Cemetery, was largely attended, which testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held.
