

RAIDS ON G.S. AND W. RAILWAY.

All sections on the Great Southern and Western Railway system have now been repaired, and traffic generally is being accepted as usual, but there is no cessation in the raiding of trains and premises.

Reports received at Kingsbridge on Saturday state that on Friday a goods train for Cork was held up at Kilmacthomas and four wagons opened; Cork parcel office was raided and a parcel removed; and Bellywilliam station was raided and cheques taken from the safe. At Rathmore, passengers' luggage was removed from the 6.5 p.m. train from Malow.

The bookstall at Killarney station was broken into on Friday night, and again at Cahireiveen the store was entered and consignments for a number of parties removed. The cloakroom at Tipperary was also raided by armed men, and luggage deposited there was rifled.

DEATH OF MR P RYAN.
