## THE CITY SHOOTING ACCIDENT.

### Victim Succumbs.

Patrick Tabridy, 18 years of age, residing in Michael Street, City, who was accidentally wounded in the neck by a revolver bullet, on Thursday morning in Frederick Street Barracks, succumbed to his injuries in Barrington's Hospital yesterday morning. The deceased was an officer in the Limerick City Fianna, and from the outset no hope was entertained for his recovery.

### The Inquest.

#### Verdict of Accidental Death.

An inquest was held by Mr J S MacNeice, City Coroner, and a jury, relative to the death of the deceased youth. The inquiry, which was conducted by Brigade Officer Costelloe City Police Force, was held in the boardroom of Barrington's Hospital last evening.

Evidence of identification was given by Michael Tabridy, Michael-street, a brother of the deceased.

The evidence of the principal witness, a member of the Fianna, showed that he was in bed on Thursday morning in the barrack, and was called by deceased, who stood at the foot of the bed. Witness had a revolver under his pillow—it was a non-cocking revolver—and in taking it out the trigger caught in the mattress and went off accidentally, the bullet entering Tabridy's neck.

The Commandant in charge of the barrack stated he was asleep in bed when the accident occurred. He was awakened by the report of firearms, and getting out went to see what had happened. He saw the deceased rustling out of a room bleeding from a wound in the neck. Witness followed him, and at the head of the staircase Tabridy fell back into his arms. He promptly rendered first aid and sent for Dr McGrath, who examined deceased and had him sent to hospital in the Fire Brigade Ambulance.

Dr M P Dandon, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, deposed to the deceased being admitted to the institution about 9 o'clock on Thursday morning. He examined him, and had him put to bed. He was suffering from a bullet wound in the neck. There was no exit, and death was due to shock and hemorrhage, as the result of a bullet wound.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental death, due to shock and hemorrhage as a result of a bullet wound in the neck. They expressed deep sympathy with the relatives of the deceased in their bereavement.

Brigade Inspector Costelloe, on behalf of the police, joined in the expression of sympathy with the relatives.
