**THE CITY SHOOTING ACCIDENT.**

The remains of the late Patrick Tubridy, 18,  
an officer in the Limerick Fianna, who was  
accidentally shot in Frederick street barrack on  
Thursday morning, and succumbed subsequently  
in Barrington's Hospital, were interred in Mount  
St Lawrence Cemetery on Sunday evening. At  
half past five the funeral left St John's Cathedral,  
and was attended by a large concourse of the  
general public, Volunteers, and members of the  
Fianna. St Michael's Pipers Band headed the  
procession, and played the funeral marches. At  
the graveside prayers were recited, after which a  
firing party fired volleys, and the "Last Post" was  
sounded. The chief mourners were—John  
Tubridy (father), Michael, James, and George  
Tubridy (brothers).

**THE DOCKS DROWNING FATALITY.**

**Inquest on Victim.**

An inquest was held in the Town Hall on  
Saturday evening by the Deputy Coroner, Mr M  
Costello, and a jury, into the circumstances con-  
nected with the drowning of John Rodgers, a  
native of Middlesborough, in the dock on Friday  
night.

Evidence of identification was given by the  
master of the vessel "Largo Law," in which  
deceased was employed as donkeyman.

It was stated that while Rodgers was boarding  
the steamer he slipped off the rope ladder and  
fell into the water. He disappeared and never  
rose again.

The medical testimony, as given by Dr J. G.  
Holmes, showed that there were no external  
marks of violence on the body. Death was due  
to asphyxiation caused by drowning.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental  
death due to drowning.
