EXTENSIVE CATTLE DRIVING IN CLARE.

From Corofin it is reported that the land

 and herds were warned not even to look for the
 cattle, and one farmer who ignored this order was
 fired on while looking for his stock. There
 have been arrests, and Dail troops are day and
 night scouring the country for young men
 suspected of being implicated. In the Corofin
 district several men are "on the run."

Hundreds of cattle are starving through the
 country, and some of the animals are dying of
 hunger on the roadside.
