A decision has just been made of the Provisional Government that no reductions can take place in the rates of postage, telegraph, or telephone at the present, because of the position of the Irish Post Office. ## DEATH OF MR T. A. McINERNEY, B.C.

The death took place at Barrington's Hospital last night of Mr Thomas A McInerney, 10, Lock Quay, at an early age. Some three weeks ago Mr McInerney, who was an officer in the Mid-Limerick Brigade, I.R.A., was accidentally shot in the right buttock at the New Barracks. He had a revolver in his pocket, and while starting a motor car the weapon went off. His condition from the outset was considered serious, and the medical staff at the institution had the wound X-rayed for the location of the bullet, but it could not be traced. On Sunday last, Sir Thomas Myles, the eminent surgeon, arrived from Dublin and saw the patient, but was unable to do anything for him, as he failed to locate the bullet. During the week, Mr McInerney's condition grew worse, and yesterday he was unconscious and passed away as stated late last night. The deceased was a member of the Limerick City Volunteers since their inception some years ago. He figured prominently in the celebrated events leading up to the landing of the late Sir Roger Casement on the Kerry Coast during Easter 1916. It will be remembered on that occasion Mr McInerney was the driver of the motor car that ran into the sea at a point below Killorglin, when all the other occupants of the car were lost. He was subsequently arrested and imprisoned for a considerable time, being released in the general amnesty following the Easter Week insurrection. Early last year he was again arrested, and interned in Ballykinlar, and released after the truce. At the municipal elections in 1920 he was returned on the Council as one of the representatives of the Irishtown Ward, and in his capacity as a member of the Corporation his activities in the interests of the city were considerable. He was a painstaking and efficient administrator, and his death in the prime of life, and under such tragic circumstances, has been learned with sincere regret in the city, where he was very popular. The sympathy and condolence of a wide circle of friends will be extended to his mother and family in their bereavement.

The remains will be removed to St John's Cathedral at 8 o'clock this evening, and the funeral will take place on Monday morning for Mount St Laurence Cemetery, after solemn Requiem Mass at 11 o'clock.
