DEATH OF MR J. McNAMARA.

The death took place at his residence, Carr
 street, on Thursday evening of Mr John
 McNamara, up to recently an Inspector in the
 City Night Watch. The deceased had reached a
 good age, and had been ailing for a considerable
 time past. He was a courteous, obliging, and
 efficient official, who carried out his duties im-
 partially. Prior to the passing of the Local
 Government Act, 1898 the Corporation of the
 day passed a resolution disbanding the Night
 Watch, with the object of having the city
 patrolled by the Royal Irish Constabulary. In-
 spector McNamara and his men opposed the
 mandate of the Corporation, and a deadlock
 followed. Inspector McNamara refused to hand
 up the keys of the watch establishment at the feet
 of the Town Hall, and eventually the Corporation
 of the day went out of office, and under the
 Mayoralty of the late Alderman J Daly the Night
 Watch was rehab lished and retained.
