LISTOWEL FAIR.

A large fair, with an all-round reduction of £1 per head on recent fairs, this reduction being particularly applicable to yearlings. Three-year-old bullocks realised £17, £18, and £20 each; two-year-olds, £8 to £12 10s; yearling bullocks and heifers from £6 to £8. Springers and milch cows, principally purchased by local buyers, sold at from £12 to £14; second and third calving cows from £8 to £10 10s. Bonhams, of which there was a numerous supply, went from £3 to £4 10s each; bacon pigs, £5 per cwt (l.w.).

Killed in Motor Collision.

Paris, Saturday.—A despatch from Chambery, Savoy, states that Mrs Kendal Bushe, the widow of the Anglo-Indian general of that name, has been killed in a motor collision.

DEATH OF MR JOHN GODSELL.

The death which we announce with regret took place, at his residence Glenworth street, early yesterday morning, of Mr John Godsell, at an advanced age. The deceased was a member of the Limerick Operative Bakers Union, and in his time took a deep interest in the Trades Union, and political movements. He was in early life a member of the Fenian Brotherhood, and in the early eighties he was arrested as a suspect under the Foster regime. In 1899, after the passing of the Local Government Act, he was elected a labour member of the Corporation, and held office for some time. He was President of the Mechanic's Institute, and on the occasion of his retirement he was presented with an illuminated address from his colleagues for his fidelity to the labour cause.

FATAL FIGHT ON IRELAND.

Two Men Remanded.

Hull, Monday.—At Hull to-day two Irishmen, belonging to Poplar, were remanded on a charge of manslaughter. It was alleged they caused the death of a fellow-seaman on board the steamer Dido during a quarrel on Ireland. The deceased was heard to say the Irish could not frighten him. One of the accused and deceased stripped and fought. The deceased received a blow in the stomach, dying later.

STRIKE IN AUSTRIA.

Public Services Suspended.

Vienna, Monday.—Owing to the strike of the State employees the entire railway, postal, telegraph, and telephone services have been suspended throughout Austria since 6 o'clock on Saturday evening.

WILLIAM ROCKFELLER DEAD.

New York, Saturday.—William Rockefeller, brother of John D Rockefeller, died to-day, aged 81.—Central News.

Five doctors under the charge of Mr William Rockefeller's personal physician, were in attendance when the end came, and practically the entire Rockefeller family were at the death-bed.

Mr Rockefeller contracted a heavy cold last week-end. He had just completed building a mausoleum constructed at a cost of 250,000 dollars, according to his own plans and under his personal direction, in Sleepy Hollow Cemetery.—Reuter.
