BRITISH TELEPHONE FEES.

The reductions in telephone fees in this country
come into operation on Saturday. The principal
concessions are—Installation rental for a con-
nection to a private residence where no business
is carried on has been reduced by 30s per annum,
making the new quarterly rental 35s in London,
32s 6d in Birmingham, Liverpool, Manchester,
Glasgow, and 30s elsewhere. The charge for two-
party lines will be 22s 6d per quarter for a resi-
dence connection, and 30s for a business connec-
tion. The fee for a local call will be reduced from
1½d to 1¼d, and the charge for a call over a dis-
tance between 5 and 7 miles will be 2¼d instead
of 3d. Extra mileage charge will be lowered from
25s to 20s per furlong. A similar reduction ap-
plies to external extensions and to private tele-
phone wires.

DEATH OF MR J. STUNDON.

The death, which has been learned with

deceased, who was about 65 years of age, was a
licensed victner, and was held in great esteem by
a large circle of friends. The funeral takes place

WHOLE WORLD 'DRY.'

Pussyfoot Johnson's Prophecy.

"In ten to fifteen years the whole world will be
dry," said Mr Pussyfoot Johnson, on the Cunard
Liner Saythis in mid-ocean interview with a
representative of the "Cunard Daily Bulletin,"
the Atlantic wireless newspaper. He disclaimed
however any intention of forcing prohibition in
England.

Mr Johnson told the interviewer, says a wireless
message from the ship, that he is coming to
England to confer with London prohibition agents
to arrange the first World League Convention
against alcohol at Toronto, beginning next Novem-
ber. On 20th July he leaves England for New
Zealand.
