COMMISSION.

Work Suspended Till October.

The following official statement, signed by J.S. Douglas, chairman, and T.A. Murphy, secretary, has been issued—

"On the completion of the first part of the work of the Commission which dealt with the bonus 'out' of 1st March last, a Joint Post Office Departmental Committee, consisting of the heads of the Department and of representatives of the staff, was set up at the suggestion of the Commission to see if the inquiry into the conditions generally of the Post Office could be more conveniently and expeditiously carried out by that means. That Committee has held three meetings. Owing to the state of public affairs at the moment, it finds itself unable to continue the work for the present, and has decided to postpone its further deliberations until October next.

"Under these circumstances the Commission will also stand adjourned, and will not meet again until it becomes necessary for it to review the work of the Joint Departmental Post Office Committee."
