ONE OF LIMERICK VICTIMS.

Funeral of Mr James O'Leary.

The remains of the late Mr James O'Leary, who was shot by a sniper during the firing in Limerick, were removed by motor to Ennisecorhy, where the interment took place. The deceased, who was the second eldest son of Mrs O'Leary, Market Square, belonged to a highly esteemed County Wexford family, and the greatest sympathy is felt for his bereaved mother, brothers and sisters.

He was employed in Todd's drapery establishment, and left the city when the firing started. He returned on Wednesday last, and was proceeding to the residence of a friend when he saw a man taken down by a sniper. He rushed at once to the assistance of the wounded man, and was then himself fatally wounded by a sniper, as was also the driver of the ambulance when it arrived soon after.
