## PARTY OF IRREGULARS

### Encountered at Kilmallock.

#### Ten Killed--Several Captured.

National forces closed round Kilmallock last  
 night. During operations a party of 30 irregulars  
 were encountered at one period.

The National forces opened fire on them with  
 a Lewis gun. Six irregulars were killed, and  
 several captured.

A party of irregulars was also observed in a  
 house. The National forces attacked the building.  
 Four irregulars were killed, and some taken  
 prisoners.

### The Kilmallock Ambush.

Writing of the ambush at Kilmallock on  
 Tuesday, the special representative of the "Irish  
 Times" says:—

I have just returned from collecting the dead  
 bodies of the men who were shot in yesterday's  
 ambush. Waving a Red Cross flag and followed  
 at a distance of 200 yards by a cart, three of us—  
 a priest, a young cinematograph officer, and  
 myself—advanced along the hollow road which  
 had proved so disastrous. Looking at it again I  
 wondered how anybody escaped. Indeed, if the  
 irregulars had disposed their machine gun  
 differently no one would have escaped.

At the scene of the fighting we were received  
 courteously, and a little suspiciously, by a  
 party of four irregulars, hardy men, well  
 armed, and well disciplined, and on our under-  
 taking that the three men with the cart were  
 unarmed they allowed them to come forward.  
 One of them then conducted the three Red Cross  
 men and myself to where the bodies were lying.  
 Two of them lay in the ditch where I had last seen  
 them, and had noticed that they were too much  
 bunched together. That machine gun had got  
 into them after all. The third was in the flanking  
 ditch, some 50 yards away, shot clean through  
 the head. The irregulars had composed the  
 bodies, and placed their heads in their folded  
 hands. Cork men, all three of them, and all  
 under 20. An hour before there had been a fourth  
 man, who was supposed to be dead, but he must  
 only have been wounded badly, for he had crawled  
 away, and could not be found.

The names of the soldiers killed are—Volunteers  
 John Quirke (Tralee), Murphy (Killarney), and  
 Corporal Con Sullivan (Killarney).
