FUNERAL OF MRS M HARTNEY

The remains of the late Mrs M Hartney, whose
death occurred under tragic circumstances at
Adare, on Friday evening, were interred
yesterday morning in Mount St. Law-
rence Cemetery. On Sunday evening at half-
past eight the remains reached the city from
Newcastle West by a circuitous route, and were
taken to St. Michael's Catholic Church,
where they rested overnight. Yesterday
morning at 10 o'clock Requiem High Mass
was sung for the repose of the soul of
the deceased, the celebrant being the Rev. Fr.
Carroll, C.C. At the close of the Mass the funeral
left for the Cemetery. The cortege was of large
and representative proportions, and expressed the
sympathy felt for the husband and family of the
deceased in their sorrow.
