Dr M. Clery, Coroner, Hospital, opened an inquest last evening, in the licensed premises of Mr Owen Ryan, Pennywell, into the circumstances connected with the fatal shooting of Victor Meany, of Murroe, at Castleconnell, late on Sunday night.

Inspector Dineen, Civic Guard, conducted the enquiry on behalf of the authorities.

Evidence of identification having been given, the medical testimony showed that death was due to shock and hemorrhage caused by gunshot wounds.

The enquiry was then adjourned for a week.
