CITY TRAGEDY.

Man Fatally Shot.

A shooting occurrence took place in Limerick between nine and ten o'clock last night, involving the death of Mr. James Foley, New-street, Limerick. Although exhaustive enquiries have been made regarding the tragedy, no actual light has been thrown on it so far as to how the man met his death. It is learned, however, that another man, William Moloney, a lineaman on G.S. and W. Railway, living in Roperie, was admitted to Barrington's Hospital last night, suffering from a bullet wound in the right thigh and left foot. From a statement he has made to the Civil Guard, it has transpired that Moloney was with Foley at the time of the shooting, which, he states, took place at the junction of Frederick-street and the Dock-road. Mr. Foley, when picked up after the shooting, was taken to St. John's Hospital, where life was found to be extinct. He was a young man, and leaves a wife and family to mourn his loss. An inquest is to be held this evening.

IRISH JUDICIAL SYSTEM.

Parish Courts Abolished.

A decree of the Minister of Home Affairs abolishing District and Parish Courts outside the City of Dublin is published. The Dail Eireann Courts were abolished in July last, save District and Parish Courts outside the City of Dublin. These remaining District and Parish Courts will cease to exist as from Monday next. A committee has been at work for some weeks past devising measures for dealing with the business of Dail Eireann Courts not completed at the date of their abolition and for the enforcing of decrees granted by such Courts. Provision will also be made for the trial of prisoners charged before these Courts. An announcement as to the nature of these measures will be made shortly.

FUNERAL OF BAKI

The funeral of the late M.B.E., of Blackmore.

The funeral of the late M.B.E., of Blackmore, Summerhill House, Co. occurred somewhat late in the afternoon on October 27th, took place at St. John's Church, Whetstone, on the 11th, the interment being in the Baskindale family vault. The choral service was conducted by the Rev. A. News, Vicar of St. John's, assisted by the Rev. G. B. Gordon Stokes. The first part of the service was brought to a fitting close by the effective rendering of the "Dead March" in "Saul" by Mr. Herbert Swain, the organist. At the entrance to the vault, which was tastefully decorated by Mr. Welsh, the head gardener of "Woodside House," were gathered the principal mourners:—Colonel Hamilton-Wedderburn and Mr. Aylmer Cleave (sons-in-law), Mr. H. Lloyd Baxendale, Mr. R. H. Chichester, and Captain Edgar Phelps (cousins), besides many indoor servants and tenants of the Blackmore End estate. Many magnificent floral tributes were noticed, and, in particular, a large cross of pink carnations with centre of violets extending the full length of the coffin, from her only son, Captain Patrick Vincent, M.C., who is at present serving with his regiment in India. THE INQUEST.

Mr. J. S. McNelis, City Coroner, held an inquest on the body of Daniel Nevin last evening. Superintendent Dreen conducted the enquiry on behalf of the Civil Guard.

Dr. J. G. Holmes deposed on examining the body. There were some small bruises on the front of the body, and one bruise over the right cheek bone. Witness saw the deceased about a week ago at the Strand Barracks, and he was relieved of duty owing to a pain in the left knee, due to the effects of an old operation. Death might probably be due to heart failure, but witness could not say definitely without a post-mortem.

To the Superintendent—It would be possible to cause death by a blow of a fist in the region of the heart. To the Coroner—The neck presented a blue appearance, and death could also be caused by deceased being jostled violently.

John Mulqueen, 13 Mangret street, stated that he carried on business at that address as a publican. The deceased was in his premises last night between half-past nine and ten o'clock, and was seated in a form with John Bond and his wife. Witness was at the lower end of the counter when he heard a scuffle, and he also heard Bond say he could not stick it. Bond was in the attitude of striking when witness came on the scene and then ran out of the bar. The deceased had at that time fallen off the form on to his knees, and was unconscious. Witness rendered first aid, and had the ambulance sent for and the deceased taken away.

Michael Crowe, Francis street, stated he was in Mulqueen's licensed premises on Thursday night, and saw the deceased there as well as other people, including Bond and his wife. The latter was speaking to the deceased and then Bond jumped up, saying "I can stand this no longer," at the same time striking deceased on the body and face. Bond left the shop, and Nevin fell to the floor. He was picked up unconscious, and replaced on the form. Witness then went for the ambulance to the Fire Station, and when he returned Nevin was dead.

Patrick Barrett, Kerry-row, Mangret-street, giving corroborative evidence, stated that Bond struck deceased on the right cheek bone once, and twice on the body. Nevin fell on his knees, and Bond left the shop. Witness lifted deceased and placed him lying on the form, remaining until the ambulance arrived. Deceased was unconscious all the time. The doctor at Barrington's Hospital examined the body while in the ambulance, and pronounced life extinct.

John Lewis, Taylor's Row, Gerald Griffin-street, stated he was in Mulqueen's publichouse and saw deceased, John Bond and his wife seated on a form. While witness had his back turned he heard a scuffle, and the next thing he saw was deceased on the ground. Witness helped to pick him up, and remained until the ambulance arrived.

Superintendent Dreen asked for a post-mortem in view of the insufficiency of the medical testimony. The Coroner concurred, and the enquiry was adjourned until 4 o'clock on Tuesday next.

ACCUSED IN COURT.

Last night the accused, John Bond, was brought before the magistrates, Alderman J. Casey and Mr. R. Slattery, on a charge of manslaughter, and on the application of Superintendent Dreen he was remanded for eight days.

IRISH RAILWAY PROBLEM.

Commission Recommends State Control.

The acquisition of the Irish railways by the State is advocated in the majority report of the Commission appointed by the Provisional Government to inquire into the present position of the undertakings, the best method of administration, and the relations between the workers and the companies. In a minority report Mr. O'Dea recommends unification, with Government control for three years.

Lord Justice O'Connor (Chairman), and Messrs. Thomas Johnson and E. McLyseagh, in their majority report, recommend that, under State control, the management should not be under a State Minister, but should be directed by a National Railway Board constituted as follows:—A railway expert as chairman and managing director; a representative of the manufacturing industries; a representative, nominated by the Chamber of Commerce; two representatives of agriculture; two representatives of Labour; an Irish Treasury official.

They estimate the present market value of the entire Irish railway stock at between twenty-five and thirty millions, and they suggest that these should be acquired by a tribunal, who should issue bonds "bearing a reasonable rate of interest,"
