RENT INCREASED.

A letter was read from the Chamber of Commerce applying for an increase of rent for the offices held by the Harbour Commissioners.

It was decided to offer the Chamber an increase of £20 a year, bringing the rent up to £70 a year.

TROOPS AMBUSHED NEAR CASTLECONNELL.

A cycling party of National troops travelling between Castleconnell and Birdhill on the main road to Nenagh yesterday evening, was ambushed at Goug Hill, a couple of miles from Castleconnell. Intense fire was poured upon the troops from a sandpit, and the soldiers, having dismounted, took what available cover that offered. They replied to the heavy fire of the irregulars, who were apparently in considerable numbers, and armed with machine guns and rifles. The fight, which lasted for half an hour, was very hot, the troops, numbering from nine to twelve, behaving with great gallantry. The report of the firing was heard in Castleconnell, and when reinforcements arrived the irregulars had beaten a retreat over the rough and hilly country in the district. The troops suffered no casualty, while a man named John Biggitt, a farmer's son in the locality, was shot dead, having come into the line of fire.

DEATH OF MR JAMES P DUNDON.

We regret to announce the death, which took place in Barrington's Hospital on Sunday night, of Mr James P Dundon, Prospect Hall, Co Limerick, at an advanced age. The deceased was an extensive farmer, and a well-known and popular resident of the county. He was brother of the late Mr John Dundon, solicitor, and of Mr J T Dundon, Bardskyle, Patrickswell, and was for many years a Commissioner under the Land Purchase Act of 193. The interment took place in Clounanna Cemetery to-day, the funeral being attended by a large number of city and county people.
