CHEAPER IRISH POSTAGE.

Printed Paper Rate Reduced.

The rate of postage on "Printed Papers" posted in the Free State was reduced from yesterday (November 1st), to correspond with the rate charged by the British Post Office.

The new rate will be:—

1oz., or under, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; 1 to 2ozs., 1d.

Every 2oz. up to 2lb., $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

"Printed paper" means a packet not exceeding 2lb. containing books, pamphlets, sketches, photographs, maps, plans, and charts; and under certain conditions, commercial or business papers such as invoices, receipts, price lists, and quotations, deeds, agreements, circulars, Christmas cards, manuscript for Press and printed proofs, educational exercises and examination papers.
