THE HARVEST.

The harvest in these islands has now been completed, and it is possible to arrive at authoritative data as to the results. The variable weather in September caused discoloration with injury to the quality of the grain, while lack of sunshine caused both barley and cate to ripen slowly and unevenly. Under the of commetances the yields were not what they would have been under more favourable atmospherical conditions. In the case of wheat, as we learn from the Department's monthly statistical statement of agricultural sonditions on the 1st of October the quality is stated to be poor, the grain having badly filled. Oats turned out a variable crop, while barley was cut and stacked under fair conditions though fully three weeks later than usual, and though the yields were good, samples were variable. It is very satisfactory to observe that potatoes are expected to "lift a much over average crop," which means a great deal for the country, seeing that the potato is the staple article of food for man and beast. It is noteworthy that the exports of tubers from Ireland to the three months July-September-were small compared with a year ago, but in the last twelve months they were more than twice as great as the year previously. There are some interesting observations in the report concerning the fruit erops. It is shown that the general effect of the early dry season, followed by a wet and cold Summer and Autumn, was to delay tree fruits in ripening, and at the same time caused them to be under-sized. Want of sunshipe, we read, "and of a sufficiently warm temperature prevented apples from swelling, and from colouring and finishing properly." At-the same time the trees bore well, as late frosts did not put in an appearance. Owing to plentifuluses of supplier, prices of fruit have been so far lower than usual. Exports from this country in the three months above mentioned were less than one half of those a year ago, but on a twelve months' comparison they were over 50 per cent. higher, So much for the Itish harvest. We have to remember the world's barvests, too, and that as to these the year brings its own particular season. As the "Farmers' Gezette," in an interesting article on the subject remarks, it takes imagination to picture wheat being cut and saved in distant Australia and far-off Argentine when fields are bare here, and snown con whirling round to blur the landscape. That is one of Nature's wonderful mappenations and prevision for the needs of mankind. And as the paper saye, it is good to know that we have the ends of the earth to draw upon for our supplier, and that when stores are reaching emptiness in one country the first CURFEW REMOVED IN LIMERICK of a new season's grain crop is coming in another land.
