

THE LIMERICK COURT-MARTIAL.

Shooting of Lieut. Hanrahan.

At 11 o'clock yesterday morning, in the New Barracks, Limerick, the Military Court re-assembled for the trial of Gerard Fitzgibbon and Joseph O'Connor, civilians, Carey's-road, who are charged with shooting and mortally wounding Lieutenant Joseph Hanrahan, National Army, in the Roxborough-road, Limerick, on the night of the 17th October.

The trial was adjourned from the 18th instant for the production of a military witness, who was not then available, being on duty in a remote part of the command area.

At the sitting of the Court yesterday morning, the Prosecutor said he had to apply for a further adjournment. The military witness, whose evidence was material, had not arrived from Kerry, where he was at present on duty. His evidence was essential, inasmuch as he was alleged to have found the deceased officer's revolver after he was shot. He asked for a reasonable adjournment of the enquiry to enable him to produce the soldier, and suggested that a date that would suit counsel for the defence be fixed.

The President—What has counsel to say to the application?

Mr A Lynn, B.L. (instructed by Messrs Little and Uhuadaigh, solicitor, Dublin), for the accused, said he could not object to the application in the circumstances. He asked, however, that a reasonable adjournment be granted.

The President—Very well. Any date that will suit you.

Mr Lynn said he wished to have a note made by the Court of two questions he desired to put before them—(1) If the officers and men of the Provisional Government Army were subject to military law; and (2) if the gentlemen constituting the Court possessed the requisite rank in accordance with army regulations, and for what period of time prior to 18th inst.

The President took a note of the questions.

The Court then adjourned until 11 o'clock on the 6th December.

CITY DISTRICT SESSIONS.

Statement by Mr Flood.

At the opening of the City District Court yesterday, Mr Flood said in view of the fact that Courts had not been long in operation in Limerick, and that the people were not yet quite aware that they would be held regularly, he would not take such a strict view of cases which were now to come before him as he would otherwise have done. There were some prosecutions under the Licensing Laws, and his remarks would also apply to those. He pointed out that it was in the interest of licensed traders themselves that their business should be fairly and properly conducted, as there was a growing temperance movement in the country, and it would be advisable that there should be as few complaints as possible in this regard. At present the Courts would have to be guided in dealing with their business by the existing code of laws, but they looked forward to the date when they would be administering laws by their own people for the people of Ireland in an Irish Parliament, when they would be administered with no greater pleasure than by him and his colleagues.
