On the motion of Mr M Griffin, seconded by Alderman J Casey, it was decided to forward the names of Messrs Stephen O'Mara, senr, and Michael Gough, B.C, to President Cosgrave for nomination on the National Senate.

### DEATH OF RIGHT REV. MONSIGNOR RYAN.

We regret to record the death of the Right Rev Monsignor Arthur Ryan, P.P, V.G, Tipperary, which occurred at his residence yesterday morning. The deceased clergyman, who was some 70 years of age, had a distinguished career as a Churchman, and had been parish priest of Tipperary since 1903. He was born in 1852 at Scarteen, Co. Limerick, was educated at Oscot College, and ordained in 1876. He was a great worker in the cause of the Irish language, and an undeviating supporter of the policy of the late Mr John Redmond. He was untiring in his devotion to the welfare of his flock and the advancement of his country. He was an authority on Irish music, and delivered an interesting lecture on that subject at the Catholic Literary Institute some years ago. He was brother of the late Major-General Thaddeus Ryan, Scarteen.

### CO. CLARE BOY'S ESCAPE FROM ARMED MEN.
