#### 22 Men Captured.

### ARMY CAPTAIN SUCCUMBS TO WOUNDS.

Captain Thomas Walsh, National Army, who  
was seriously wounded in an ambush on Wednes-  
day, near Newport, has succumbed to his injuries  
in St John's Hospital, Limerick, whither he was  
removed with another soldier wounded on the  
same occasion. In all four soldiers, including  
deceased, were injured. From the outset there  
was no hope for Captain Walsh's recovery. He  
was a native of Nenagh, and quite a young man.  
The remains have been taken to Nenagh for  
interment.
