ish to draw your attention to a nuisance which is nightly staring you in the face of this city. The recent innovation of the proprietors of our cinema theatres in procuring, prior to the commencement of the performance, coloured slides advertising the various city establishments. This unwarrantable exhibition is in my opinion a mean advantage of the general public who wish to take their evening's amusements in an atmosphere which will make the worries connected with their business adventures, and it is surprising to have night after night these advertisements thrust before the eyes of the public. There is a time and a place for everything, and the proprietors of these theatres would more advantageously benefit themselves by advertising more liberally in the city Press, and also keep the public from doing at home, as I believe is done, by an English firm. Likewise, the distribution of these advertisements on the streets would go a long way towards relieving the unemployment, which is at present so prevalent. We are aware, very considerably, that advertising being quite legitimate, it should not be taken by anyone. Last night at the city theatres a performance commenced at 9 o'clock did not terminate until 9.10 owing to the proprietors, which interests nobody but the exhibitor, and the exhibitor had unwillingly to see this waste of time and spend ten minutes of the night on the subject of time, a condemnation of the performances is given, when one bears in mind the length of the performance, and more so in this. If you will throw your mind back to the time when a reg'ime and the imposition of British military, the performances were never less than ten minutes, and very often more than ten minutes, and in Dublin, Belfast, and other places, the performances average from 2½ to 2¾ hours, and now no longer exist in Limerick. The same is anticipated.
