DEATH OF MR THOMAS BERNARD.

We regret to record the death of a venerable
and highly esteemed citizen, Mr Thomas Bernard,
which took place at his residence, Rutland-street,
on the 22nd instant. Deceased, who had attained
the fine old age of 90 years, was for a long span

with the social life of Limerick. He was a highly

the other members of his family sincere sympathy
is felt in the bereavement that has come to them.
