Bank Official's Death.

Last evening, while motor cycling to his residence at Adare from Croom, where he was engaged as an accountant in the Munster and Leinster Bank, Mr. Richard O. B. Fuller was accidentally run into, as the result of a collision, by a military Ford motor car at Carras Cross. He received injuries which terminated fatally at 1 o'clock this morning in the County Infirmary, Limerick, whither he was removed. DEATH OF MR A ENRIGHT.

The death, which has been learned with feelings of deep regret in the city, occurred after a serious illness on Thursday evening, of Mr Alphonsus J Enright, Vicar, aged early age. MOTOR AND DRAY IN COLLISION.

Last night a collision took place in O'Connell Avenue between a motor car and a light dray, with, fortunately, minor results. The vehicles were travelling in opposite directions, and when outside Asset Terrace the motor, which, it is said, was not showing a light, ran into the dray, breaking the shafts but not injuring the driver or horse. The chauffeur of the motor was, however, injured by the impact, as he was hurled against the wind-screen and his face badly bruised and cut.
